If you do have any concerns or queries regarding these assessments, please discuss these firstly with your child's class teacher.

MR FOREMAN'S ECO CORNER

Diamonds are a girl's best friend!

Or so the song goes, but are they really the planets best friend? Probably not. You may know that diamond and gemstone mining can be a very destructive process, but I didn't know quite how destructive. It takes approximately 250 tons of mined earth to produce just one carat of diamond. That's a huge amount of devastation.

Worryingly, regulations governing mining operations vary in different parts of the world, and in some areas where diamond mining is very lucrative, there may be few, if any, regulations. Many companies take advantage of the lack of regulation and take no steps to restore local eco-systems or habitats once a mine is no longer productive but instead move on to their next operation without regard for what they may leave behind. So, what's the answer? Lab-grown diamonds, or eco-friendly diamonds?

Eco-friendly diamonds are ethically created with no direct or indirect impact on the Earth. Physically and chemically they are identical to their natural counterpart, plus the bonus of being a lot, lot cheaper. As a very rough comparison you'd be looking at around £1,800 for a 1 carat lab diamond, a natural diamond of the same carat weight and quality would be closer to £8,000. How are they made then? Well I'm no diamond expert, but from what I've read lab grown diamonds are created in an artificial setting which mimics how they are made naturally (through immense heat and pressure), hence why lab diamonds are almost exactly the same as natural diamonds. But would you have one? Some jewellers say interest has grown by more than 2,000% in five years, as people look for more affordable options. A study of 1,500 would-be husbands and wives found 70% would be willing

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to opt for a lab-grown alternative. And it's not just newly-weds that are switching; generally, sales of lab grown jewellery are up by 65% year on year. So, it appears that people are making the move, which is great news for the plant, and of course the recipient of the diamond too!
