ATTENDANCE

Our whole school attendance this week is 89.87%. Overall attendance this year to date 93.81%.

No classes achieved 97+% attendance this week.

184 children remain in the 100 club with 100% attendance. 184 pupils currently have attendance of 98% or above.

Year 6 secondary school applications

The application process for secondary school places has now closed. Termly home projects and homework

Each term we ask that the children complete a home learning project linked to the learning they have been doing in school. It is a wonderful opportunity to work alongside your child to produce a project driven by their curiosity, questions or knowledge about the term's learning. The first of this year's home learning projects are due in at the end of this term, so now is the time to encourage and support them in coming up with a project idea. Class teachers have sent home possible suggestions for you to explore and develop further. Taking a little time each week to work on the project will help to consolidate their learning and ensure that there is not a rush to get it completed in the last week of term. We have seen some fantastic projects come in over the years and we look forward to celebrating the children's efforts together when we invite parents in at the end of the term to share in your children's work and see the work of the other children in their classes.

Alongside the termly home learning projects, we continue to set weekly spellings, reading and times tables tasks. Finding a little bit of time each day to complete these tasks will be more beneficial than one longer session once a week for both retention and minimising anxiety that can come with homework. If homework is an issue or you would like help in supporting your child to complete their homework, please get in contact with your child's class teacher via the office or by speaking with them at the end of the school day.

Understanding your Child's Behaviour workshop

The workshop will also give those attending, strategies to support children in different, and often tricky, situations. We will focus on parent/carer-child interactions, increasing positive interactions and discuss strategies to support with setting clear expectations and boundaries for behaviour difficulties. This workshop will also include self-regulation strategies for children, discuss parental self-care and will recommend helpful books and resources.

How to clean your devices

This week's free online safety guide focuses on how to clean devices. Our electronic devices can be a breeding ground for germs and bacteria. The guide takes a look at a few tips such as not rubbing too hard when cleaning, how often to clean your devices and to keep your hands and faces as clean as possible.

E-SCOOTERS

Kent Police are advising the public to ensure they understand the laws around E-Scooters use before purchasing. E-Scooters are classed as motor vehicles and are required to be taxed and insured. It is not possible to get insurance for privately owned escooters, which means it is illegal to use them on the road or in public spaces, such as pavements.

Enforcement

The police are obliged to take action against anyone who is caught repeatedly using an e-scooter illegally or in a way that causes a nuisance to others. In these circumstances, the police have the power to seize the e-scooter under Section 59 of the Police Reform Act/165 of the Road Traffic Act. You risk a £300 fine, six penalty points endorsed on your driving licence and the E-Scooter being seized. If you do not currently hold a driving licence at the time of the offence, you may be prosecuted and may have to go to court, whereby the fine can increase and your ability to obtain a driving licence in the future may be affected.

If you purchase an E-Scooter, it can only be used on private land with the landowner's consent. Please find the Kent Police poster attached.

FIRE SAFETY

Kent Fire and Rescue Service have issued a safety warning on the use of lithium-ion batteries following several battery related fires across the county.

Lithium-ion batteries, or li-ion batteries (sometimes called LIBs) are commonly found in many items including mobile phones, laptops, e-bikes, hover boards and e-scooters.

Firefighters are urging the public to take care when storing and using these types of batteries, and to think twice before purchasing items from non-reputable suppliers. MR FOREMAN'S ECO CORNER

Solar Panel Update

We've had our solar panels up for a whole year now. Lots of people have commented on them, lots of other schools have asked about them. It's great that people are interested and hear how successful they have been so I thought I'd give you an update and share how they have performed over the last 12 months.



So far, we have generated 79,458 kWh. Now that figure may mean nothing to you, but to put it in perspective that's enough power to make around 110,000 cups of tea, almost as many as the teachers drink in a week!!!

Overall, they have produced around 40% of the school's total electricity use. As you are aware, with the cost of living crisis and energy costs spiralling, the panels have also saved us a considerable amount of money as



well, which we have been able to put back into the school, rather than spend on bills.



Not only this but we have saved over 18t of CO₂ emissions going into the atmosphere. Again, a figure that cannot really be grasped, so that's approximately 19,600 Mars Bars or 1217 miles of Mars Bars if you put them in a row. If we carry

on like this then can you imagine how many Mars Bars worth of CO2 emissions we could save over 25 years? Nearly half a million! That's almost as many as the teachers eat in a week!

All that is not bad for our first year and, coupled with our other eco projects, we are well on our way to being net zero.
