# **VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS**

School budgets have been affected in recent years by a reduction in funding and an increase in costs. This means we are not able to allocate hardship funding within our budget to support families in paying for activities such as swimming. In extreme circumstances where we agree to support, money is diverted from other allocated funds so meaning a reduction of resources within that area.

Therefore, although we are permitted to request a voluntary contribution for additional activities, I would ask that you contribute the full amount if you are in a position to do so. This will allow us to ensure that families in financial deprivation are supported to ensure that their child is not disadvantaged.

## TEACHING & LEARNING NEWS

Earlier in this term, Year 4 carried out a second round of the Official Unofficial Multiplication Tables Check (OUMTC) on Times Tables Rock Stars. This is in preparation for the Multiplication Tables Check (MTC) that Year 4 children will be completing at the end of the year as a statutory requirement from the Department of Education (DfE). It is an online assessment in which children are asked 25 multiplication questions and have 6 seconds to answer each question. Last year, the national average score was 20/25 with 25/25 being the most frequently recorded score. Year 4 are working hard on their times tables and the table below shows the progress they are making. However, there is still work to do.

We want as many children as possible to know their times tables. It makes such a difference to the rest of their mathematics learning as they move up through the school and in to secondary school. In last year's Maths SATs Arithmetic paper, 78% of the marks available involved knowledge of the times tables. Across all three Maths papers, 66% of the marks required the use of

times tables knowledge. The Maths curriculum after Year 4 focusses more heavily on multiplicative relationships and reasoning and many of the new concepts they explore rely on knowledge of the times tables: fractions, percentages, ratio, area, volume. We ask that parents continue to support their children practising their times tables regularly; little but often is the key. Taking a few minutes each day to practise via the TTRS website/app has been shown to improve a child's tables knowledge. Practise makes permanent - a child who can automatically recall their tables facts puts less demand on their working memory, allowing them to tackle more complex problems with increased confidence and accuracy. Supporting your children to learn their times tables is an impactful investment in their learning that will continually pay dividends throughout the remainder of their time in primary and secondary school. Practising times tables does not/should not stop after Year 4 nor does it only begin in Year 4. Years 3, 5 and 6 also need to continue to practise their times tables on a daily basis. If you know your child struggles with their tables knowledge and require ideas/strategies/games to support them to develop this crucial knowledge, please do come and speak to your child's class teacher. Equally, if your child is confident and you'd like ideas to stretch and challenge them further, come and discuss how with your child's class teacher. Children learn their sounds so they can read fluently and automatically, freeing up cognitive energy to understand what they have read. Children learn their times tables so they can calculate fluently and automatically, freeing up cognitive energy to understand the important concepts in Maths.

## MR FOREMAN'S ECO CORNER

## World's first year-long breach of key 1.5C warming limit

It was a sad day in the Eco Corner office when I read the above. But what does it mean?

Back in 2015, world leaders promised to try to limit the longterm temperature rise of the planet to 1.5C, which is seen as crucial number to help avoid the most damaging and irreversible impacts on our planet.



This first year-long breach doesn't break that Paris agreement, but it does bring the world a lot closer to doing so. You may be thinking, well it hasn't really affected us in Herne Bay, and maybe not directly, although I have noticed that our summers do seem to be getting a

lot hotter. But globally, last year we were hearing far more about floods, droughts, heatwaves and wildfires; and this is just with only a 1.5C increase. Imagine a 2C increase. Just that extra half a degree - the difference between 1.5C and 2C of global warming - greatly increases the risks of passing so-called tipping points.

These are thresholds within the climate system which, if crossed, could lead to rapid and potentially irreversible changes.



For example, if the

Greenland and West Antarctic ice sheets passed a tipping point, their potential collapse could cause catastrophic rises to global sea-levels.

A landmark UN report in 2018 said that the risks from climate change - such as intense heatwaves, rising sea-levels and loss of wildlife - were much higher at 2C of warming than at 1.5C. At the current rate of emissions, the Paris goal of limiting warming to 1.5C as a long-term average, rather than a single year, could be crossed within the next decade.

All this does sound very cataclysmic, and a bit 'end of the world is nigh', but unfortunately, we are now really beginning to see the real effects of global warming and we can't turn a blind eye to it anymore.

Thankfully, we can still make a difference to the world's warming trajectory. Most encouragingly of all, it's still thought that the world will more or less stop warming once net zero carbon emissions are reached, although reducing emissions by half this decade is seen as crucial to achieve this.

We can still control how much warming the world experiences, based on our choices as a society, and as a planet. It's down to us to make those green, sustainable changes for the better.
